Systems: Transition to a sustainable World

System- - A set of interconnected parts named and embodied within a boundary that, for us, forms a meaningful whole: something which, taken together has meaning for us

Transition - The action or process of passing or passage from one condition, action, or (occas.) place, to another (shorter Oxford dictionary)

Sustainable - causing, or made in a way that causes, little or no damage to the environment and therefore able to continue for a long time (Cambridge dictionary)

World - Natural environment - a place of settlement

The need for a transition to a more sustainable world is widely accepted but it cannot be assumed that understanding what sustainability is, is a given. Isolated efforts to tackle what are perceived to be key issues do not always yield anticipated outcomes, they may even be counter-productive. What we should recognize is that what we have is a network of interconnected problems, described by Ackoff as systems of problems or 'messes'. To make sense of these messes we need to adopt a holistic perspective. Systems thinking provides the intellectual framework and systems practice the lessons which enriches the theory. The conference is designed to promote and capitalise upon such thinking and will provide examples of how these ideas might contribute to sustainability.

Rodney Irwin, [Rodney is Chief Operating Officer](#) (COO) and a member of the Senior Management Team (SMT) at the World Business Council for Sustainable Development (WBCSD), based in Geneva, Switzerland. [World Business Council for Sustainable Development](#). WBCSD is a CEO-led not for profit organisation of >200 leading businesses working to accelerate transition to a sustainable world. As COO, Rodney provides leadership of WBCSD's enabling functions (Finance, HR, ICT and Facilities), and is responsible for WBCSD's corporate governance and statutory duties as the Company Secretary. He also leads the WBCSD education program, for which he manages the organisation's relationships with key education partners Rodney is engaged in researching system change in decision making, disclosure and assurance. He holds Advisory and Academic positions with the following: Council Member: International Integrated Reporting Council (IIRC); Professor of Accounting and Sustainability, Leuphana University, Germany; Lecturer at Yale School of Management, USA and Research Fellow at Lancaster University Management School, UK.

Ray Ison, became Professor of Systems at the Open University (OU) in 1994. He is a member of the [Systems Thinking in Practice \(STiP\) program](#) involved in researching and teaching, particularly team co-authoring and presenting Post-Graduate modules such as 'Managing Change with Systems Thinking in Practice' and 'Evidencing Systems Thinking in Practice'. These are developed and presented within the OUs MSc and Systems Thinking Practitioner Apprenticeship awards. He has also led and/or contributed to a range of major research, scholarship and teaching programs and projects as part of the [Applied Systems Thinking in Practice \(ASTiP\) Group](#). His [research and scholarship](#) span the biophysical and social and is primarily interdisciplinary, international and collaborative. He is recognised for his work on *systems praxeology* and *social learning* within rural development, sustainability management, systemic governance and the design and enactment of learning systems, Prof. Ison is the current President of the IFSR ([International Federation for Systems Research](#)); he has also served as President of ISSS (International Society for the Systems Sciences) and as a Trustee of the American Society of Cybernetics. In 2022 he was given a Lifetime Achievement Award by the Systems Society of India 'for contributions to the transformation of society with a systems approach.

The UK Systems Society. The UKSS was formed around 1975 and since then has been actively engaged in advocating and supporting Systems thinking and practice. In 1999 the society was registered as an educational charity and in that guise offers seminars and workshops open to all those who want to learn more about holism and how Systems ideas can help make sense of the many challenges human society faces. These challenges cannot be overcome by approaching them through the traditional disciplinary 'silos' but through a collaborative and interdisciplinary approach. Systems thinking and practice is the very apotheosis of interdisciplinarity. The society has hosted conferences since the mid 1980's held at different universities across the United Kingdom, latterly because of the restrictions caused by Covid 19 pandemic, these have been 'hybrid' a mixture of physical and virtual participation. For several years several highly successful conferences were held at St Anne's college Oxford, next year the conference, its 23rd, returns to traditional face to face attendance hosted at St Hilda's college Oxford (<https://www.st-hildas.ox.ac.uk>). The Society owns the journal *Systemist* in which fully refereed papers are published from a variety of topics across the disciplines in two issues per year.
